

Log-in with your unique code to create your profile, favorite items in the agenda to create your own schedule, explore the Virtual Resources and Services area, and virtual grab bag items. If you have registered, and have not received your credentials, please email registrar@apti.org.

You can view and participate in the virtual conference through your desktop or the mobile app.

Set your clock! All events will occur on EDT, so make sure to note the time difference from where you'll be watching.

Log-in early. Events will have a virtual lobby prior to many events; log-in early to make sure you are connected, hear audio and if needed, request any technical assistance before the presentation

Download the app. Access this year's conference app by downloading the free **EventScribe** app, open it and search for 'APT DC 2021'. You will be prompted to log-in with your Username and Password which is the same as your log-in for the website.

Once downloaded, you can set up your profile and schedule.

- b. Your registration details ARE NOT synced with this app. You must go through each session and "favorite" them. Your preferred calendar app may be synced with your choices.

Dear Attendees,

On behalf of the Association for Preservation Technology International, I am pleased to welcome you to APTI's second virtual conference in a row, and third conference theme around the United States' National Capital Region which first occurred in 1981, and later in 1995. The topics of the conference focus not only on the challenges of preserving a national capital, a city state, associated neighborhoods, buildings, monuments, and infrastructure that are reflective of this monumental city. Additionally, the challenges of preserving a planned city, which has had ongoing growth and changing demands on the built environment hold important lessons learned.

Urban construction challenges, upgrades to existing buildings for increased accessibility, protection of cultural assets from material aspects, ongoing environmental change and increasing terrorist threat are routine practice in Washington DC. WS1-URM Construction, Restoration, and Maintenance Workshop (\$)

Thursday, October 28, and Friday, October 29

10:30 - 5:30pm EDT



The Unreinforced Masonry (URM) Construction, Restoration, and Maintenance workshop will focus on understanding the rationale and methodology for condition assessment, seismic assessment, and the repair, restoration, maintenance, and seismic upgrade of historic URM buildings. The workshop will provide insight into common types of deterioration and material behavior along with specific intervention methods and materials that may be appropriate and sympathetic to the original materials. Treatments consider the U.S. Secretary of Interior Standards when the URM building is historic.

WS2-Graffiti management in a changing world: Should it stay, or should it go? (\$)

Thursday, October 28, and Friday, October 29

10:30 - 5:30pm EDT

Through lectures, case-studies, and video demonstrations, this workshop will introduce participants to a range of topics regarding graffiti management including: graffiti's long history and varied types; when to consider preservation/conservation; means and methods of documentation even when removal is planned; proper means and methods for removal; and graffiti-prevention strategies. Instructor-facilitated breakout sessions will give participants the opportunity to practice/develop their decision-making skills surrounding the various aspects of graffiti management.

WS3-Decorative Finishes in the Nation's Capital (\$)

The workshop will also explore the process of gilding, focusing on recent projects at Washington DC Union Station and the Eisenhower Executive Office Building. In a mixed lecture/question and answer format, the gilder will describe the process and challenges of these projects, and will then lead a second hands-on, at home gilding project for all attendees.

SY1 - Protecting the Irreplaceable: Sensitive Measures to Cultural Heritage

Thursday, October 28

This 2-day symposium was developed in response to the growing need for physical security improvements to culturally significant properties and collections against man-made threats. Learning how to sensitively introduce security measures without adversely impacting the historic character of buildings and landscapes is challenging, but can successfully be achieved.

Given this year's APTI Conference is in the District of Columbia, it can be argued that no other location offers the level of opportunity to explore this topic more fully. This training gives attendees guidance on understanding security threats, along with principals and strategies for protecting cultural heritage, staff and the general public. Case studies will highlight properties where changes were made, while still meeting preservation guidelines.




